
Summary of Results from Assessment Day 2024



Here are the results of this year's survey.




Gender305 responses


3. Ethnicity 305 responses


4. Childhood Environment (Mark all that apply)


5. Before coming to Faith, I had cross-cultural missions/service experience(s) outside the United States or Canada.






7. Since coming to Faith, I have had cross-cultural missions/service experience(s) outside the United States or Canada (missions trip, MAP, etc.)






9. While a student at Faith, I am planning in the future for an overseas cross-cultural missions/service experience (missions trip, MAP, etc.)



10. If yes, my planned experience(s) will be in the following location(s). Mark all that apply. 305 responses




11. Before becoming a student at Faith, I participated in a missions/service project(s) in the United States or Canada targeted for the following people groups. Mark all that apply.




12. Since becoming a student at Faith, I participated in a missions/service project(s) in the United States or Canada targeted for the following people groups. Mark all that apply.

With the large influx of new students for the 2023/24 school year, we had a much larger group of freshmen take the survey this time. There were also more seniors (55) than juniors (46) [Q1]. 47% of respondents were male, while 53% were female [Q2]. The vast majority of answers came from white students (88.5%), with Hispanics making up the second largest group at 3.9%. The remaining ethnicities ranged anywhere from 0.7% to 3.6% of total answers [Q3]. Nearly half of this year's respondents (47.5%) have experienced small town life during their growing up years, while 39.7% have lived in a suburban setting and 32.5% in a rural setting at some point in time. Only 19.3% of our students indicated a time of living in an urban setting [Q4]. Students were asked to mark all that apply to their life situation. Four students (1.3%) marked all four types of childhood environment, 16 (5.2%) marked three of the four, and 74 (24.3%) marked two of the four options. 211 (69.2%) marked only one of the choices which would indicate that most of our students have not been exposed to more than one type of environment during their childhood.

The heart of the survey was divided into two main categories – experience cross-culturally in a location other than the United States or Canada, and experience serving within the borders of the US or Canada. Each of these two main categories was divided into three time sections: 1) before coming to Faith, 2) since coming to Faith as a student, and 3) plans for the future while a student at Faith. When asked which countries or ethnicities applied to their experience the respondents were asked to mark all that apply.

<u>Cross-cultural missions/service experience outside the US or Canada</u>

- Before becoming a student at FBBC: nearly one third of our students had experienced some sort of cross-cultural ministry/service either on a missions trip, as an international student or as a missionary kid (MK) [Q5]. 10.8% of those experiences were in South America, 6.9% in Asia, 4.9% in Africa, and 4.6% in Mexico, Central America or Europe [Q6].
- Experienced while a student at FBBC: 15.4% of our students have had an international missions/service experience since becoming a student at FBBC. 84.6% indicated they had not had a cross-cultural experience since attending here [Q7]. For 7.2% of the students who did have a cross-cultural experience outside the US or Canada this experience was in Europe and for 5.6% it was in South America. A few others worked in other countries or continents [Q8].
- Plans for future cross-cultural experience while a student at FBBC: 31.8% of Faith's students are planning to work internationally while they are a student here [Q9]. 12.5% would like to work in Europe, 9.8% in Asia, 9.5% in South America and 7.2% in Africa. The remaining 5.6% are looking to serve in other regions of the world [Q10].

<u>Cross-cultural missions/service experience within the US or Canada</u>

- Before becoming a student at FBBC: 159 or 52.1% of our students indicated that they had participated in a missions/service project within the border of the US or Canada. 42.3% were

among white people, 25.9% among Hispanics, 21.6% among Blacks, 11.5% among Asians. The other 30.2% of our students' experiences were among the other ethnicities listed [Q11].

- Experienced while a student at FBBC: Nearly 1/3 of the respondents have participated in a missions/service project within the US or Canada since becoming a student. Of those students, 30.2% were among whites, 19.3% among Blacks, 14.1% among Hispanics, 7.9% among Asians and the remaining 18.4% among the other ethnicities listed [Q12].
- Plans for future cross-cultural experience while a student at FBBC: 36.4% of the students indicated they were planning to participate in a missions/service project while a student at the school. 27.5% indicated that would be among whites, 19% among Hispanics, 18% among Blacks, 11.5% among Asians, and the remaining 30.1% split among other ethnicities listed [Q13].

Summary of answers given in Q14 and Q15

[Q14 - 150 responses] The leading answers given about the <u>benefits</u> of participating in a missions trip were:

- learning about a different culture and how God works all over the world
- learning about missions first-hand and how ministry works in different cultures
- personal spiritual growth
- getting a burden for ministry generally and in other countries specifically

[Q15 – 135 responses] The leading answers given for hindrances to participation were:

- lack of funds
- lack of opportunity
- lack of time / other obligations
- fear of new circumstances
- not feeling called to go

Comparisons to the previous three surveys:

- the population of the school became more diverse in 2022 with a 12.3% non-white population, but decreased slightly again in 2024 to 11.5% compared to 11.6% in 2020 and only 5.5% in 2018
- the environments in which our students have grown up has not changed much since 2020; nearly half our students have lived in a small town setting and only 20% have lived in an urban setting
- in 2024 a new high percentage of students who have NOT had cross-cultural experience prior to coming to FBBC was reached; 68.5% said they had no previous cross-cultural experience compared the average of 64.3% the previous three surveys
- in 2020 nearly a 5% increase in students who have had a missions experience while a student at FBBC over 2018; however there is a marked drop in those numbers from 2020 to 2022; for 2024 the numbers show an increase of 8.6% of those who have had a missions experience while a student
- nearly 10% decrease in students planning an international experience while a student at FBBC in 2020 over 2018 with a slight rebound in 2022 of 1.5% and another rebound in 2024 of 3.7%
- participation in domestic missions trips prior to coming to FBBC dropped again from 2022 to 2024 in keeping with the trend since 2018, but there is a marked increase in exposure to all ethnicities over 2018
- apparent large decrease since 2018 in students participating in domestic service trips while a student; numbers for 2022 and 2024 remained the same right at two-thirds of the student population
- after a substantial growth in the number of students NOT planning a domestic missions trip between 2018 and 2020, the numbers seem to have leveled out from 2020 to 2022; another marked drop of 6.6% to nearly two-thirds of the students from 2022 to 2024
- the responses to question 14 about the benefits of the cross-cultural experience are very similar for all years; the same can be said for the responses to question 15 about the hindrances to participation

One of the greatest benefits I got from growing up on the mission field was that I got to see many diverse cultures and many different people groups. This helped me see that all people are precious in God's eyes, and we should love them dearly.

One missions trip where I volunteered at a camp, it taught me how to serve others effectively

Learning a different culture and language was extremely beneficial.

Being able to reach out to your community and share the love of Jesus.

I loved while I was in Mexico seeing God work in the same way he does here in the U.S in another country. There was a common bond in Christ.

I enjoy learning from others and have had amazing experiences. It is very encouraging to see different people worshiping God in their own language and unique way.

One of the greatest benefits from experiences of going on a missions trip overseas is that you can see a great need people have for Jesus and that can help you be motivated to go on more mission trips.

"I learned more about what the Mormons believe. I also learned ways I could better start conversations and lead them to the gospel. I saw how God can use me to open eyes to the truth. One of my friends who came on our trip also realized she had never been truly saved and got saved that week, which was an awesome experience to see God at work.

Though I don't know if it falls under the category, I also worked at camp one of my college summers. I learned how to deny myself, rely on God for strength, endure through hard days and rejection, and trust God alone as the one who can satisfy."

The greatest benefit from working with different ethic cultures has been to see the ways in which culture effects theology. For example, Vietnamese Americans do not want to put their culture to shame by converting from Buddhism to Christianity.

Having the opportunity to serve people from other cultures or other walks of life has been helpful in getting me out of my bubble. I have grown up in small-town Midwest and so there is not as much diversity as there would be in a larger city or in another area of the country. Going on these trips has allowed me to become more compassionate towards others even if they aren't like me. It has also helped me to see how important it is to know the people that you are ministering to. If you come in with your ideas of how to serve without considering the people or culture, you will step on toes and hurt others, but if you have the humility to consider the people you serve, you will be able to have a better ministry.

The missions experiences I have had have been used by the Lord to direct me towards full-time missions.

I did a week long VBS at the Mexico border. It was so humbling to watch young children get snack and ask if they could take it home so they could have dinner. It helped me to just realize how fortunate we are in America, and still we somehow feel like we can complain about things.

I really appreciated the cross-cultural experience in both traveling to Africa and being in Africa. I feel like this trip was the first time I really interacted with people from different ethnicities.

Being obedient to where the Holy Spirit calls me to go. In other countries, I have nothing to rely on or fall back on because it's a completely new place where I stick out like a sore thumb. So, in the moments where I'd begin to feel overwhelmed all I could do was pray. It's through this that I realized prayer is not a last resort that I have to go to when everything else is failing, but rather it's a powerful first step.

One of the benefits is helping me to be more aware of the personal and national culture of others. It taught me how to be patient and kind toward all people.

I learned how the gospel needs to be shown to others and it's true importance.
